
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
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



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Learning About Atlantic Canada

By drawing and colouring a map, you are learning to identify why we use symbols and colours on a map. You are also getting to see what Atlantic Canada looks like from the top down. By labeling parts of these provinces, you are learning some of the important locations within them.

Follow the directions:

- 1. Label these bodies of water:
 - (Note that bodies of water use italics slightly tilted letters)
 - St. Lawrence River
 - Gulf of St. Lawrence
 - Smallwood Reservoir
 - ATLANTIC OCEAN
- 2. Label the provinces and their capital cities:
 - Newfoundland & Labrador St. John's
 - New Brunswick (N.B.) Fredericton
 - Nova Scotia (N.S.) Halifax
 - Prince Edward Island (P.E.I.) Charlottetown
 Note that if you choose to use abbreviations, you should include these in your Legend
- 3. Label the province and countries that border the Atlantic provinces:
 - Québec
 - Saint Pierre & Miquelon (an independent territory of France)
 - United States of America (U.S.A.)

4. Colour the WATER blue

5. Colour each of the provinces a different colour.

Learning About Atlantic Canada

In this assignment you will be able to choose which cities you think are important and which products you feel are important in each province.

Follow the directions:

1. Label these bodies of water:

(Note that bodies of water use italics - slightly tilted letters)

- St. Lawrence River
- Gulf of St. Lawrence
- Smallwood Reservoir
- ATLANTIC OCEAN

2. Label the provinces: Newfoundland & Labrador, New Brunswick (N.B.), Nova Scotia (N.S.), Prince Edward Island (P.E.I.). Note that if you choose to use abbreviations, you should include these in your Legend.

3. Label the province and countries that border the Atlantic provinces:

- Québec
- Saint Pierre & Miquelon (an independent territory of France)
- United States of America (U.S.A.)

4. Color the WATER blue. At the end of all the labelling, colour the provinces.

5. Label the capital city for each province, the capital city of Canada and \underline{two} other cities of <u>your choice</u> in each province.

6. Do some research and identify two products for each province. Show this on the map using symbols and then tell what the symbols represent in the Legend. Then colour the provinces each a different colour.
